Welcome to our newest member Mary Sinclair. Her information can be found on the membership page of our guild website.


With sadness I mention the passing this month of our member Mary-Lee Turner on January 12th. Per Mary-Lee's wishes there will not be a service.

As you may have noticed, this month continues on the topic of quilt magazines. As I discussed last month, I really love perusing hardcopy quilt magazines. I flip through them and mark patterns I want to try. After doing this, I have to put those magazines some place. I went to my cupboard where I keep my magazines, and alas, it was full of other wonderful magazines from the past. Uh oh, now what do I do? Every couple of months I receive more magazines. Just like my fabric collection, my magazine collection seems to be overwhelming the space in which I store them. I cannot just cram them in and hope for the best.

Before I could put away my recently acquired magazines, I was forced to go through my stored magazines and toss out any that I no longer want to keep. But how to choose what to toss and what to keep? There are so many patterns I marked and wanted to keep. I was in a dilemma, if I keep all these magazines I run out of space. If I toss them out, then I will miss out on some really cool patterns.

My solution was to go through the magazines, cut out those marked patterns, and toss out the rest of the magazine. I am currently storing those saved patterns in plastic sleeves inside a binder. Unfortunately, this binder also takes up precious storage space.

The long-term plan is to scan the patterns into my computer and create pdf documents that I can store in the "cloud", and I then print them out later when I use them to make a quilt. Voila! - two birds, one stone. I clean out the cupboard, toss out the magazines, and keep the preferred patterns - or is that 3 birds? Storing the pattern documents on the computer clears more room in my storage cupboard, yay room for more magazines! I happily made room for the magazines that I will be receiving in 2020 while keeping those wonderful new pattern ideas. My husband Bruce has a scanner on his computer, so guess who gets to help me with the scanning and pdf document creating?

On a related topic of magazine perusal, during this exercise, I discovered that there are some really detailed sewing and quilting instructions in the back of quilt magazines. For instance, included in the last few pages of the Fons & Porter's Love of Quilting and McCall's magazines is a section called "Sew Easy". These pages include fabric cutting and block sewing tips. I could not just discard all these words of wisdom, so I cut them out and saved them too!

The pages I cut out include: quick-pieced-triangle-squares, setting a square on point, quick-piecedflying-geese, paper foundation piecing, mitering corners, fussy cutting, curved piecing, bias strips, cutting and sewing 8-at-a-time triangle squares, and managing bulky seams. I look forward to trying some of these techniques in some of my future quilt projects.

A month or so ago, Nancy Allen taught several of us in the CH4 Studio how to sew lovely blue and white star blocks using the quick-pieced-flying-geese process. I discovered this process was included in both the McCall's Quilting magazine and the Fons & Porter's magazine. The quick-pieced-flying-geese process was very clever, and the resultant blocks were really beautiful.

I hope you have fun using this tidbit to create more space in your sewing room and to learn new quilting skills. I am looking forward to perusing more magazines as they come in the months to come. And oh yeah, watch out Bruce, I have a 2020 honey-do project for you!
